The Centenary of The Dominican Congregation of St Catherine of Siena in England 1921 - 2021

And The Internment of Ashes of Sr. Maura Kelly Feast of the Visitation 31st May 2021 at St. Luke's Pinner

As Mary set out to visit her cousin Elizabeth she needed both faith and courage to undertake the journey and to make that act of loving kindness to support the much older woman who like her was expecting her first child. Elizabeth's babe leap in her womb as Mary, the Ark of the Covenant bearing Jesus, God's promise, entered the house. There was joy and amazement as both women recognised that God is always true to His promise but that He works in mysterious ways.

One hundred years ago, in 1921, the Oakford Dominican Sisters of St. Catherine of Siena, arrived in England to begin God's work here. Like Mary, theirs was a journey of faith and courage from South Africa and Germany to make their first foundation in this country. There was great hope, there was fear but above all there was trust in the Lord as they arrived both to bring and to be the Good News in lives of dedicated service to Christ and His Church in our country.

Convents were founded, work was commenced and continued, recruits for the Order were accepted especially from Ireland. It was a time of planting and harvesting and with enthusiasm the Sisters could truly sing with Mary,

"My soul glorifies the Lord and my spirit rejoices in God my Saviour." (Luke 1:46)

With all the ups and downs of normal life the Sisters did great work in education and nursing, in parishes, retreats and wherever the need was so that they truly served the Lord mindful of St Paul's words in today's Reading:

"Work for the Lord with untiring effort and with great earnestness of spirit"

Romans 12:11

These Daughters of St. Dominic sought for God's kingdom to come powerfully and His will to be done in great things and small.

The Second World War came then the hard won peace and a time of great austerity. The world, as always, was changing. At last material prosperity emerged bringing new challenges to the western world and to the Catholic Church. We all know to our cost today, in the light of the Covid pandemic, that the term, 'return to normal', is wishful thinking and that yesterdays world is gone, gone forever however much we may want it to return.

It was in the Twentieth and now in the Twenty-first Century that we all experienced a time of great change and the Oakford Dominican Sisters have been no exception. Here at St. Luke's Parish in Pinner three sisters lived with us for many years, Sr Anthony, Sr. Brenda and Sr Sarah. A brief picture of one sister, Sarah, gives but inadequate 'hint' of what all our Pinner Sisters have done for the Lord and for us. For over thirty years Sr Sarah was parish catechist, youth leader, parish visitor and friend. So many of the sick and housebound received visits, Holy Communion and loving care from her and Sr Anthony & Sr Brenda. Generations were prepared for First Communion, Reconciliation and Confirmation by Sr Sarah & her team of catechists.

Comfort and practical help was given by all the sisters to the sick, bereaved and the needy. Their generosity and service knew no bounds and so many parishioners counted the sisters among their greatest friends. What a testament to Christ and a tangible experience of the goodness of God working through these committed Dominican women.
